#### ERTH 3115: Fish and amphibian evolution

Course Syllabus

Fall 2024

This course seeks to understand the origin and evolution of fish and amphibians, as evidenced by the fossil record, and discover the transformations that took place, leading to the success of these groups.

#### **Course objectives**

Learn details of the anatomy of fish and amphibians and comparative anatomy between groups. Understand currently accepted patterns of relationships between major fish and amphibian groups. Describe key evolutionary events in the origin and radiation of fish and amphibians. Integrate evolutionary mechanisms (e.g., developmental and functional) with patterns of diversity in fish and amphibians.

#### Learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to... Recall the anatomy of fish and amphibians. Describe and evaluate patterns of relationships between major fish and amphibian groups. Describe key evolutionary events in the origin and radiation of fish and amphibians. Integrate evolutionary mechanisms with patterns of diversity in fish and amphibians.
